Historic Groundbreaking Ceremony!

The Crispus Attucks York History and Culture Center (HCC) began as a vision proposed by the "Three Amigos" Bobby Simpson, Dan Elby and Ray Crenshaw. When completed, we will have a 17,000+ square foot, three story Center. On the ground floor will be the Rev. David Orr Event Hall where we plan to host a variety of cultural programs including lectures, living history interpretations, theatrical performances, films, and music. There will also be exhibits, a café and gift shop, a community art exhibit, and possibly a genealogy center as well. As

visitors make their way up the cascading stairway to the second and third floors they will encounter our dedicated exhibit spaces. The Michael Jefferson Classroom and the CAY Library and Archives will be on the second floor. We also will host outdoor cultural events on the rooftop terrace and in the reconciliation courtyard. To kickstart our programming, we have launched several community outreach projects including the CAY Living History Project and the CAY HCC Journal. CAY HCC Historian Jeff Kirkland also curated a discussion and viewing of "A Man Called Adam" at the Appell Center for the Performing Arts as part of Black History Month







The significance of our History and Culture Center was evident in the wonderful turnout we had at our groundbreaking ceremony on November 15, 2023 when hundreds attended. They were excited by the potential of bringing the cultural heart back to Crispus Attucks through music, dance, performances, educational programming, and special events. We will bring history, arts, and culture to people of all socioeconomic backgrounds.

The HCC is intended to be a living history and culture center rather than a static museum. Our mission is to tell stark and sometimes unsettling truths while also providing inspiration as we reflect on the past, take an introspective look at the present and strive towards a more equitable future.











As many of us at CAY know, the HCC is so much more than another building on our campus. It represents the opportunity for the African American community in York to tell their unique stories in their own voices. With input from those who witnessed these historic events in their everyday lives, we will construct a complete narrative of the Black experience for the first time. It will no longer be others telling our stories from their perspective, omitting and censoring the hard truths. Over the last ninety-three years, CAY has brought the African American community together despite adversity, violence, and discrimination. Out of these trials have grown a strong, vibrant, and resilient people.

A York City native, Kiersten Mullins credits her father with introducing her to Crispus Attucks York. "He exercised in the gym at the main building," she recalls, as she described being enrolled at the Early Learning Center, or day care, as it was referred to in the past. After aging out of Pre-K programming, Kiersten quickly got involved with as many other CAY programs as possible from elementary school to early high school, including drill team and cheerleading. Barry Ness is a long-time resident of York County - he grew up on a farm in Glen Rock with 14 brothers and sisters. He knows a great deal about farming and says that his family "grew everything." In 1964, at the age of 18, he decided to work at a local furniture factory and stayed working there until 2006 when he was "laid off." He was only 61 when he stopped working and Barry never married or had children. He also hasn't been close to his siblings since his mother died in 1981.

He was living at LifePath Christian Ministries when the CAY Active Living Center Director, Robin Beatty-Smith, found him a place to live with one of her relatives in the City of York. He has resided there since February of 2023 when he joined the CAY **Active Living Center. Barry likes** to joke around and shared how he had major health scares this past year as he was pronounced dead three times - laughing how he awoke and scared the emergency personnel. He likes to be around others and says that he has made a "lot of friends here" and comes every day from 9am until 2 pm. He enjoyed the center's fields trips to Broad Street Market in Harrisburg and a casino in Maryland, and does the yoga class every day to help with his shoulder and hip arthritis. Barry also likes to have lunch at the center and says "there is always extra food to take home for dinner."





This past December, the Employment and Training Center's Senior Worker Program was able to honor their Codorus Creek Enrichment Program students at their 10th Annual Holiday Celebration. The students in this program, dubbed "The First Fourteen," have been front and center throughout the year in the ETC's activities, having spent six weeks in hands on, intensive study about the Codorus Corridor, the planned improvements for the waterway,



and all the career paths that living and working by a waterway may encompass. Throughout June-July 2023, students were chaperoned on various field trips by senior workers with the ETC, providing an opportunity for intergenerational connection.



While students were initially uncertain as to the depth and breadth of study in the CCEP, Sonjai found that this program built on her previous educational experiences, as she recalled the program's field trip to a local reservoir. All students fondly recalled their final presentation as a program highlight, having developed the knowledge to communicate with a public audience about the importance of preserving and improving the Codorus Corridor for future generations.

As the ETC plans to continue the program, the First Fourteen have their sights set on the future—with each student having developed career goals and made new friends throughout the course of the program. Abbi, another student, says that she continues to stay in contact with her cohort. For other youth thinking about the program, the students from this first cohort



would absolutely encourage them to apply. "This program is an amazing networking opportunity to make connections with other people," expressed college freshman Montika.

Most students, including Montika and Sonjai, heard about the program through family and staff at their respective schools. Offering the program as a paid opportunity for students, compensating them for their time, was also appealing.

Just like these students, older adults walk into the doors of the ETC for job training and the chance to increase their income, but have their lives changed in the process, as center employees help clients address homelessness, criminal backgrounds, and substance abuse. Moving into the new fiscal year, center employee Jomo Beatty sees homelessness as one of the biggest issues for **Employment and Training** Center clients, expressing that folks need housing to have the overall stability necessary to work. A York native and life-long participant in CAY's programming, Jomo emphasized that "working in collaboration with all CA departments the center is unique in that it takes a holistic approach when equipping people of all ages for unsubsidized employment." Mr. Beatty highlighted various interactions between staff and clients, as well as CAY's hosting of York City's first ever Stand Down to Homelessness event. serving not only homeless veterans, but the general homeless population of York City, connecting them with health and human services

CAY HOSTS ITS FIRST ANNUAL STAND DOWN TO HOMELESSNESS EVENT TO ASSIST VETERANS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

In partnership with York Revolution, Pennsylvania Career Link and York Benevolent Association and with funding support by the Veterans' **Employment and Training Center Service, United** States Department of Labor, Crispus Attucks York hosted this event on June 22, 2023. Each veteran received a tote bag of non-perishable food, free meal coupons, hygiene kits, Rabbit Transit passes, haircuts, shower facilities, dental and health screenings as well as clothing. We had 69 participants in our first year and numerous non-profit organizations provided information tables and the Veterans Health Mobile provided health and dental screenings. We received enormous support from the York community and York Revolution was generous in providing their spacious stadium and all its facilities for this event. **Our Second Annual Stand Down to Homelessness** Event will be held September 13, 2024 again at the York Revolution Wellspan Park Stadium!

"The impact Rising STARS had on my life and my family has been powerful," Shanika shared when recalling the years she has been involved with Crispus Attucks York. Her Mom sent her to our Early Learning Center when she was very young because both of her parents worked. She says that helped her to be responsible and care about school. She also attended Rising STARS throughout her adolescent years.

"I was a shy individual so I didn't have many friends who weren't family, so coming to CAY, I was able to break out of my shell, have my voice heard, and build



Shanika entered the workforce at a young age, working as a camp counselor. "It was my first real paying job" she recalls. And she continued with Rising STARS and participated in all the activities, including the Southside Steppers Drill Team, which she loved. She remembers the female life skills classes, cooking classes, swimming lessons, cheerleading, computer class, homework help - "There was always so much to do!"

When asked what Shanika gained from her years attending our Early Learning Center and Rising STARS program, she said: "To lead by example, make sure you strive to always be a better version of yourself. Be assertive, be humble, give back, and don't be afraid to challenge yourself." Shanika said she always felt surrounded by people who constantly lifted her up that she didn't want to fail. In life skill classes, she still remembers the creed: "Be encouraged, be inspired and go for it."

Tiffany shared, "I heard about Crispus Attucks at a very young age. I was a part of the Rising STARS after-school program since I can remember. I participated in GAPP (Girls Achieving Pure Potential), responsibility classes. the South Side Steppers, splash parties, volunteering, cheerleading, talent shows, homework help, and I was in the summer camp when I was younger. CA was my life as *I grew up.*" When I asked Tiffany what she learned from her experiences with Crispus Attucks York, she said that "you are to be true to yourself, respect self and others, and be willing to learn and grow. They helped mold me into the woman I am today." In addition to her experiences with the Rising STARS program, Tiffany shared that the agency was part of her upbringing with other programs. Her mother was a single mom, and she remembers carrying the rent to drop it off at the housing

The William C. Goodridge
Freedom Center and
Underground Railroad
Museum had a phenomenal
year, attracting more than
1,672 visitors and receiving
widespread acclaim for its
impactful exhibitions and
educational programs. With
the help of generous donors,

and the family of Lilienne



Emrich, we received our first donations of actual Goodridge daguerreotypes. This provided a springboard for us to produce our first photo show entitled "Homecoming, the Glenalvin Goodridge Collection at the William C. Goodridge Freedom Center." Our exhibit featured large reproductions of not only our collection, but works of Glenalvin Goodridge which are housed in major institutions such as Yale, Harvard and the NYPL, among others. Visitors were provided with a 40 page color booklet of the material, the first time Glenalvin's work has been collected and reproduced in such a format.

We continued the Homecoming theme through our annual Festival of Trees programming. The Garden Club of York and our Christmas tree volunteers worked tirelessly to incorporate photography into their trees. The themes ranged from the jazz age to the Black family and important historical moments.

Throughout the year, we have consulted with and aided leading historians in



the field of the Underground Railroad (UGRR). The Friends of Lebanon Cemetery, specifically Samantha Dorm, have helped us recognize the importance of our local United States Colored Troops (USCT) soldiers in preparation for our Spring exhibit. The Goodridge Freedom Center has participated in the work



of other UGRR advocates in Columbia, Pennsylvania, including Lenwood Sloan.
Lenwood provided the staff of the Goodridge Freedom Center, Duron Carter, Joanne Wilmore and other local Black business owners, with an immersive training session on marketing and cultural tourism opportunities.

Our director, Kelly
Summerford, has appeared
numerous times in 2023
as William Goodridge in
person and in interviews
conducted by several
television stations. He
appeared on the Northern
Central Railroad with other
living history interpreters.
Each appearance serves as
an opportunity to educate
the public on William
Goodridge's historical
significance.


MOVING FORWARD

2024 provides an excellent opportunity to honor the legacy of William C. Goodridge and his entrepreneurial spirit. 200 years ago, in October of 1824, William C. Goodridge returned to York to start his new business venture. The presence of his new barbering business, on York's Centre Square, is the first concrete historical reference to William Goodridge. In that spirit, we will usher in a series of events based on the 200th anniversary of William's return to York.

Building on our photo exhibit of 2023, we have partnered with Military Images Magazine and the Civil War Faces group, to showcase

the photography of the USCT. Ronald Coddington, an author and expert on Civil War era photography, will be our Keynote speaker. The walls of the Goodridge Freedom Center will be donned with the faces of these amazing Black military heroes. Viewers will have the opportunity to read of their contributions in an accompanying pamphlet. The exhibit is slated for April of 2024 and will run through our important Summer season of tourists.

Excited about the possibility of success, but nervous about being in class with younger students, Euniquke Mr. Green and Ms. Mylet Coble leaped to enroll in Crispus Attucks York's Youthbuild affiliated charter school after a year away. A former William Penn student, the social drama of public school gave her trouble at school. Feeling lost and tired of working at fast food restaurants, she was ready for a change. 20 years old at the time of her enrollment, knowing it was her last year to achieve her high school diploma rather than her GED was a big motivating factor in sticking with the program, which she had tried unsuccessfully to enroll in

three times before August 2022. She credited Mr. Beard and case managers for sticking by her despite having a rough start to the program.

During her time enrolled in the Charter School. **Euniquke described** gaining a sense of selfawareness, maturity, and the ability to respond thoughtfully to situations instead of reacting. She recalled how she was learning something new every week: painting one week, drywall the next

construction skills learned at the Charter School's worksites.

However, Euniquke's path took her not to construction. but to earning her CNA certification and graduating with her high school diploma in June 2023. Today, **Euniquke looks forward** to going back to school to earn her LPN and remains grateful to the Crispus Attucks Charter School, describing the program as not "just a school."





1944 **Continued Growth**

Crispus Attucks York outgrows its original building and moves to the church on East Maple Street.

1968-1969 **Community in Need**

Racial tensions in the community explode, resulting in the York Race Riots. The next year, construction begins on a community center on South Duke Street to bring families and individuals of all races together.
